Letter from the director

2015 was an eventful year for the Stevens Center. In August of 2014, we reopened Stepping Stones Children's Center, to provide quality care for children that are developing at a typical rate, as well as those with diagnosed delays or disabilities. In February 2015, Stepping Stones received its four-star licensed rating. It has grown to include 29 children of all backgrounds, ethnicities and abilities.

At the same time, nothing has slowed down at the Stevens Center. We assisted 19 people in getting jobs. 34 individuals receive ongoing community based support services. Dozens of youths attended summer camps. And I could continue....

Our success is dependent upon people in our community that believe that individuals with disabilities can and should be an active and respected part of our community. Thank you for the role you play.

tepping Stones Children's Center (SSCC), a program operated by Stevens Center, is a four-star rated, quality childcare center for children of all abilities, delays and disabilities from birth to Kindergarten.

Karla Pomilio-Hancock has ioined the staff of SSCC as Program Manager. She has extensive experience working with children of all abilities including five years at Stepping Stones Children's Center, most of which were as a lead teacher. She also was employed by Lee County Partnership for Children for a dozen years where her position included improving the quality of childcare in our area. Pomilio-Hancock believes in community involvement, which has included serving on the boards of Habitat for Humanity and Communities in Schools of Lee County.

"I am thrilled to be part of the SSCC team!" said Pomilio-Hancock. "My passion is people and everyone, regardless of their different abilities, has the right to participate in this thing called life. I want to help the children, parents and staff of SSCC be the best they can be!"

SSCC is open Monday through Friday 6:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. It is important to note that quality child care is not simply babysitting. The children at SSCC are stimulated daily in a safe environment by trained staff using developmentally appropriate materials. SSCC has some openings, particularly in the infant room. Speech therapy and occupational therapy are now available on site. Speech therapist Sharon Hahne and occupational therapist Paula Boehm each have over 25 years experience in their respective fields. Blue Cross, Medicaid, Tricare and private pay are all accepted. Children attending Stepping Stones can receive therapy as part of their day.

Attending Stepping Stones is not a requirement to receive therapy services. To meet the therapists, schedule an evaluation, or make an appointment, please call Stepping Stones Children's Center at 919.708.7866.

As Bray puts it, "Finding the right job for the people we serve is my goal, versus trying to fit people into a job. My job is to create win-win situations for employers and job seekers.

"Sometimes this means visiting with local companies to observe their day-to-day operations and requesting if I may try the tasks in order to

determine whether a job seeker with a disability can do the jobs with or without reasonable accommodations." Often, tasks carved out from several jobs can be combined into a new job that is tailored to fit the

skills, preferences and level of supports required for an individual. At the same time, this meets the needs of the employer. One such job created this year is "Tote Washer." The individual cleans out, power washes and stacks totes so order selectors

may restock them for delivery. It allows the individual to earn a competitive wage while saving the company time and money that would have been utilized for a more highly skilled employee to perform this task.

Jessica Thomas, a Stevens Center job seeker, had worked in the food service industry for five years prior to becoming a stay-at-home Mom. When her son entered preschool, she wanted to go back to work. Bray went to Sagebrush Steakhouse to speak with manager Lonnie Houston about what types of job would be a good fit for Jessica. With Jessica's bubbly personality, it was decided that a hostess position would be perfect. Bray worked with Jessica for two weeks on learning the menu, answering the phone and taking call-in orders.

When asked how the partnership has worked for him, Houston stated, "I believe that every person deserves a chance. At the same time, they have to be able to do the job. Beth was able to refer a person who is a perfect fit for our hostess position. Partnering with the Stevens Center was a good business decision."

Who can ride?

- Any person with a disability (may be age, accident, or birth-related)
 - An aide can also ride, if needed for your safety

What do you need?

- Riders will first have to register and get a free photo ID from the Stevens Center.
 - You must provide evidence of your disability.

When can you ride?

- Thursday evening from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m.
 - Friday evening from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m.
 - Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

How to schedule a ride?

- Transportation will be scheduled through the Stevens Center by calling (919) 776-4048
- Thursday rides must be scheduled no later than **NOON Tuesday**
- Friday and Saturday rides must be scheduled no later than NOON Wednesday

NC Innovations provides inspiration to college student



ince birth, Jeremy Denison has had difficulty with balance and walking, using his hands, and talking. He has received therapy throughout his entire life that has made him more independent. Equipment, such as a motorized wheelchair and touch screen computer,

also help. But, according to Jeremy, receiving NC Innovations services through the Stevens Center is what really opened the world up to him.

"I don't have to depend on family to help me do the things I want or need," says Jeremy. "My support worker does it for me."

The support worker helps with routine things like preparing meals and doing laundry. However equally important to Jeremy, the services permit him to be an active part of the community.

Depending on the day, Jeremy may be seen shopping at Wal-Mart, helping with a fundraiser at the Sanford Piggly Wiggly, assisting Gene Dickens at a DJ event, attending a local or high school sports event, or in class at Central Carolina Community College's Sanford campus as he pursues a degree in business administration.

"Because my fingers are a little stiff," Jeremy explains, "I use audio books for class. I dictate work assignments and test answers to my support worker, and she records the information." "College lets me be a 'normal' human being," Jeremy continues. "I have a chance to talk to people my own age, who can relate to what I am going through."

Jeremy's mother, Christine Denison, sees the impact the program has had on her entire family. "It is a compromise," Christine says. "You give up some privacy by having a non-family member in your home. In return, you get someone that is willing to help."

Due to the support provided by the Stevens Center, Christine is able to spend one-on-one time with her daughters. They are able to 'girls-only' things, while Jeremy pursues his own interests.

"I can attend a school event, and Jeremy can choose to come or stay home," Christine says. "He is able to make the same decisions as other young men his age."

"Having a support service in our home took some getting used to," Christine admits. "Now, having this support is almost like a lifeline – I don't know what we would do without it."



Connections program provides balance

or most people, life after high school involves going to college or getting a job. For many people with developmental disabilities, life after high school involves staying at home unemployed, or attending a segregated day program for adults with disabilities. The Stevens Center's Connections program seeks to provide a balance between the two.

Connections facilitates relationships between the eight adults in the program and the community. People from the community give time to the program, and in return receive the satisfaction that comes from knowing our community is a better place because of their efforts. Adults in Connections develop bonds with one another and friendships that

extend beyond the program time.

The program participants also connect with the community through volunteer activity. Activities include helping with Communities in Schools of Lee County, at nonprofit thrift shops, at food pantries, and with the annual Broadway Our Way spring festival.

Connections is designed for adults with developmental disabilities that are no longer in school, live at a private residence and do not receive other publicly funded support services. Individuals must be able to use the restroom and eat without assistance, and need only peripheral supervision. For more information, call the Connections Program Coordinator at 919.776.4048.





VOLUNTEERS



In 2015, the Stevens Center:

- Provided direct support to
 303 individuals with disabilities
- **Provided 12,413** units of service (defined as one service to an individual on a day). Of these, 9,826 units were provided in the community, and 2,587 were provided on-site.
- **Trained 197** people on disability-related topics.

Monday through Friday on average:

- 10 **people** received a service at the Stevens Center facility each day, AND
- An additional 34 people received community-based support each day.
